Hemp cultivation has been traced back to Central Asia in regions currently known as China and Taiwan, between 8000 and 2800 B.C.E. The Yangshao culture began weaving Hemp producing clothes as early as 4000 B.C.E. Cultivation eventually spread during the Middle Ages and was practiced in Africa, Europe, and South America. Hemp is one of the world's first agricultural crops initially used in pottery, food, and as medicine in both the seed and oil forms.

Hemp was an essential ingredient in so many products that British colonies were compelled by law to grow Hemp. Its durable fibers made it a necessity.

The Pilgrims stocked every Mayflower with plenty of hemp seeds, knowing how vital hemp fiber was to the ropes and sails used for their voyages and the many other functional building materials produced from Hemp.



History claims the first traces of Hemp found in North America between 1906 and 1611 came from English settlers. The first Mayflower got to Jamestown in 1620. American farmers began growing Hemp. It became a widely used ingredient in commerce, producing high-quality rope, canvas, clothing, paper, fuel for lamps, etc. By the mid-1600, 's Hemp was an essential staple to the economy of the northeast U.S.

Notably, the declaration of independence was written on hemp paper, and the first U.S. president, George Washington, grew Hemp on his estate.

Fast forward to 1914, and Hemp has become a highly divided yet versatile crop. Their Industrial Hemp is used for food, textiles, medicine, building materials, skincare, etc., and Cannabis has a psychoactive component that makes users feel high. In 1930 under President Hoover, the Federal Bureau of Narcotics was established. Cannabis would soon get renamed as marijuana and eventually be branded as toxic for the community. In 1937 the Marijuana Tax Act was established, and the government began taxing hemp farmers. Part of the Act declared marijuana illegal. Hemp continued to be grown but at a much slower pace. A mild resurgence at the end of World War II didn't last long. Finally, in 1970, the Controlled Substance Act listed marijuana on the same schedule 1 narcotic list as heroin and LSD. The law did not differentiate between Hemp and Cannabis, so Hemp was also determined to be illegal. F.Y.I.: No one has ever overdosed and died from Cannabis. The 13-year prohibition of alcohol ended in 1933.
